Characters: Narrator Crow

<u>NARRATOR</u>: One **sweltering** summer afternoon, Crow went out flying in search of water. She was very, *very* thirsty, but no matter how hard she looked, she couldn't find a single drop of water.

<u>CROW</u>: Oh, it is so hot outside, and I am so thirsty. I'm afraid that I might die if I don't find water soon.

NARRATOR: At last, she spotted something!

CROW: Is that a pitcher down there? I think I'll land and take a better look.

<u>NARRATOR</u>: And so Crow flew lower. She landed on the front porch of a small, **shabby** house.

<u>CROW</u>: Oh, man. Look at this house! The windows are dirty, the roof is about to fall in, and the steps are crooked!

<u>NARRATOR</u>: But there really was a pitcher sitting on the porch. Crow peered inside.

<u>CROW</u>: Water! There's water in here! I'm saved!

NARRATOR: There was indeed water in the bottom of the pitcher, but there was so little water inside that Crow would never be able to reach it.

<u>CROW</u>: Let me think... If I tip the pitcher onto its side, I might be able to reach the water.

<u>NARRATOR</u>: So Crow started to tip the pitcher over. Luckily, she had another thought. If she wasn't careful, she might dump all of the water onto the ground!

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<u>CROW</u>: No, that won't work... That was a close one! I almost lost all of this delicious water.

<u>NARRATOR</u>: Crow looked around. On the ground just past the steps, she saw a little pile of pebbles.

<u>CROW</u>: Pebbles! That gives me an idea! If I pick up these pebbles one by one and the drop them into the pitcher, the water level might rise enough for me to reach!

<u>NARRATOR</u>: So Crow got started. It was hard work, flying back and forth with pebbles in her mouth, but sure enough, the water level in the pitcher soon began to rise.

<u>CROW</u>: It worked! Yay! I'm saved! Now I can reach the water. Hey, this is really good water! Mmmm!
